keeping the books up to date. We'd also like to thank our latest volunteers, Jane Alexander and Nishat Sattar, for assisting with the occasional special project and event. We do very much rely on the support and goodwill of our friends, volunteers, and trustees to keep the Trust a successful enterprise, and we are very grateful for the help we have received from all of you over the past year.

After almost 18 months of fundraising, the newly restored Minnie Lansbury Memorial Clock was unveiled in Bow on October 16th. Actress Angela Lansbury sent a message of congratulations, and Minnie's family were on hand to celebrate. Royal Tour of the East End

On September 24th, 2008, the Trust's patron, His Royal Highness The Duke of Gloucester, KG, GCVO, visited some of our projects in the East End and south London.

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Accompanied by Trust Director Diana Beattie, Vice President Julian Spicer, and HOLT Ops Director Laura Norris, the Duke visited 810 High Road, Tottenham, St John on Bethnal Green, St George's Chapel, Woolwich, and Chislehurst Golf Club, Bromley. It was an opportunity for the Duke to see first hand some of our current projects and meet the local people who care for these historic buildings. The Duke inspected the

ruins of St George's Chapel, Woolwich, viewing the stunning gold mosaic of St George and the Dragon in the apse – the Heritage of London Trust has agreed a grant of £5,000 towards its eventual restoration, which will take place once a scheme for a new protective roof for the apse is completed. Completed Projects

Alexis & Elizabeth Emma Soyer Monument, Kensal Green Cemetery

Alexis Soyer (1810-1858) was Britain's first celebrity chef. Born in France, he made England his home, and became head chef at the Reform Club. He is best remembered today for his efforts to improve army catering in the Crimean War, where he invented a special travelling stove. It continued in use with the Army Catering Corps until the late 20th century. He wrote best-selling cookery books, and some of his sauce recipes were mass-produced by the food company Crosse & Blackwell.

His wife, the painter Elizabeth Emma Soyer (née Jones), died in childbirth in 1842. Alexis focused his grief into constructing a magnificent tomb in her memory – the Portland stone statue of Faith once held aloft a cross, while sweet cherubs flanked a portrait roundel of Elizabeth. Elaborate curved iron railings surrounded the tomb, which was illuminated by a "jet of gas-light". Soyer was buried next to his wife in 1858.

This monument has been a concern of the Trust since 1998, when the first plans to restore it were put forward – by then the railings had been removed, parts of the sculptures had been broken off or vandalised, and the sculptures were darkened by pollution. After many years of fundraising, the Friends of Kensal Green Cemetery and the Reform Club were finally able to commence a full restoration, which has seen the sculptures cleaned and restored – there are still plans afoot to reinstate the iron railings. The Trust gave £6,866 towards this restoration project, and we are so pleased that this monument can once again be appreciated.

Society of Friends & Events

The Duke of Gloucester was not the only one inspecting our current projects – HOLT friends had an equally successful tour, taking in Crossness Pumping Station, Chislehurst Golf Club and St George's, Woolwich on October 21st. It is our intention that there should be further such visits in the year ahead – what better way to see how your membership money is being spent?
